



Welcome to the Amici String Program. We hope you will find this to be a place where everyone can grow in a positive and nurturing environment, where high standards of playing are expected and all students have access to fine teaching.

Amici students are invited to participate in weekly masterclasses and technique classes, weekly chamber music coaching, workshops with guest clinicians, monthly solo recitals and the summer programs.

Junior Amici offers masterclass/technique, musicianship/ear training, chamber music and 4 recitals to string students playing RCM level 3-5.

Amicini offers violin and cello classes ranging from absolute beginner to those playing at approximately an RCM level 3-4. Classes include skill development, establishing a technical foundation for cello or violin and note reading; all presented in an atmosphere of fun. There will be 2 recitals

Expectations Of All Students

In order to make the program a positive, productive and fun experience for all participants, students should be aware of the following expectations.

- Students must be respectful of other students and faculty and bring a positive attitude of expecting to learn and to enjoy music.
- Students and parents should have an email address which they check regularly. If you are not receiving Amici emails, it is your responsibility to inform us at <u>amici.stringprogram@gmail.com</u>.
- Students should be on time, tuned, and ready to play each week at the designated hour of rehearsal or class.
- Absences must be reported to amici.stringprogram.com. Last minute illnesses or emergency absences should be reported by phone to Winona at 403-615-1145 or Fiona (Amici) 403-805-7360 or Diane (Amicini & Junior Amici) 403-852-4135.
- It is important to make every effort to attend class, recognizing the impact of absences on others. Early notice of absences is important.
 For Amici students it may be possible to participate via Zoom. Amici Students who miss chamber music without notice and due cause may forfeit their chamber music placement.
- The programs are intended to enrich the musical education of string students currently studying privately. All students are required to be studying on a regular basis with a private teacher.

- Students must not bring snacks or any sort of food into the sanctuary.
- Students are responsible to prepare and learn their individual chamber music parts at home and should feel free to ask their Amici program coach or private teacher if they have any questions or need additional guidance.
- Students are expected to participate in the set-up of rooms in which they are practicing and performing, and in the clean-up at the end of sessions, under the direction of the instructor of the class. This will involve helping to move music stands and chairs. Students must be respectful of the facility, taking care not to damage or dirty any part of the building.

How Amici Works ...

Amici

The Amici program accepts violin, viola and cello students playing from an intermediate to an advanced level. Minimum requirements for admission to the program are:

- repertoire level of approximately RCM Grade 6
- knowledge of at least one 3 octave scale
- well established skills in shifting and vibrato
- · skills in note and rhythm reading

Junior Amici

- repertoire level of approximately RCM Grade 3 and above
- Knowledge of third position

Amicini

• From absolute beginners to RCM Grade 3 /4

Placement in classes will be at the discretion of the directors in consultation with the student's private teacher.

Collaborative Artist Funding

One of the goals of the Amici String Program is to support students in their study of solo repertoire, by providing weekly masterclasses and access to guest clinicians.

Amici and Junior Amici students registered in weekly masterclasses may take advantage of a subsidy for rehearsal with an approved accompanist.

Amici students: four hours (240 minutes)

Junior Amici students: one hour (60 minutes)

A *minimum* of two rehearsals before any performance is strongly recommended.

Amici students may work with any collaborative artist listed in the handbook. Leila Linton is the designated collaborative artist for Junior Amici.

If you wish to work with an accompanist other than those listed on the forms please contact us at *amici.stringprogram.com*.

Amici will pay approved accompanists for their performances at Amici Solo Recitals or at regular Monday classes.

NB: Family members may not be approved as accompanists paid by Amici. Please email with questions.

Technique and Masterclasses (Amici Only)

Students enrolled in the technique/masterclass portion of the Amici program should be ready to play a polished piece or part of a piece in masterclasses on a weekly basis. Listening critically is an important part of the masterclass experience. Students should have a notebook and pencil at all classes to take notes. Masterclasses will alternate with technique classes at the discretion of the instructors. Students should be prepared to play three octave scales using the Galamian pattern, in various bowings, for the technique classes.

When guest clinicians are invited to Amici, students will be selected to perform based on readiness and equality of opportunity at the discretion of the director. Some clinicians will be available only to the older students. Students selected to perform for guests will be notified a week in advance.

Students must dress appropriately when playing for guest clinicians (no jeans or running shoes). In most cases this will involve bringing a change of clothes from school. If in doubt about appropriate attire, ask one of the Amici teachers. Students who are not appropriately dressed will not be permitted to play.

Students who are not selected to perform in the masterclass with guest clinicians are expected to listen to the class and take notes.

Parents and the general public are encouraged to attend masterclasses and classes with guest clinicians.

Recitals

Amici

Playing in public is an important part of becoming a musician, and Amici's public recitals are an important part of our musical outreach to the community.

Amici recitals are held Sundays between 1pm and 5 pm at Bethany Chapel of Calgary. Recital participation is done on a sign-up basis, and is encouraged but not mandatory for Amici students. Exact recital time assignments will be sent out via email and scheduling will be arranged according to the needs of the collaborative artists.

Any Amici student with a "performance-ready" piece may sign up to play in the recitals, which are held approximately monthly as listed in the calendar. Registration fees are \$20 per student for each recital in which the student wishes to participate. Cash or a cheque made out to the Amici String Program Association should be paid to the assistant by the last Monday before the recital. To ensure that each piece is ready for performance, students may not sign up for recitals more than a month in advance. A fee of \$20 will be charged for NSF cheques.

We encourage Amici students to work with one of our approved accompanists listed on the recital form. Should the student wish to play with an accompanist other than one designated as an Amici accompanist, the student must pay the accompanist for the performance as well as any rehearsals incurred.

All pieces to be performed in recitals must be fluently memorized and polished (except sonatas, which can be played from music). Students must dress appropriately for each recital. Students in jeans or running shoes will not be allowed to participate in the recital.

Students outside the Amici program who are at a Grade 6 standard and above may also participate if there is room, subject to the discretion of the Artistic Director. These students will pay a registration fee of \$30 for each recital.

Junior Amici

Playing in public is an important part of becoming a musician.

One of the goals of the Jr. Amici String Program is to support students in their study of solo repertoire, by providing four public recital opportunities.

Students must dress appropriately for each recital. Students in jeans or running shoes will not be allowed to participate in the recital.

Faculty BIOS

Fiona Carnie Violin, Artistic Director (Amici Coach)

Fiona Carnie is the co-founder of the Amici String Program and currently maintains a large teaching studio and performs often locally while organizing and providing vision for the Amici String Program. Ms. Carnie has guided generations of string players to the fulfillment of their individual goals. Her students perform with major orchestras and teach at major institutions across the country.

In 1989 Fiona Carnie was invited to follow her mentor and much-loved teacher Dr LIse Elson as senior violin instructor in the Academy Program at Mount Royal College. In accepting this position, she interrupted a successful freelance career in Toronto where she played professionally in the National Ballet Orchestra, Canadian Opera Company, Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony and many other groups.

Her academic credentials include a Bachelor of Music with Distinction from the University of Calgary and a Master of Music from Yale University, where she studied under New York Philharmonic concertmaster, Sidney Harth, and Syoko Aki. In 1996, Ms. Carnie was invited to join the College of Examiners of the Royal Conservatory of Music and examined until 2014. She regularly tours Canada as an adjudicator and clinician. She has also completed the Rosza Arts Management Program.

Rachel Baljeu Collaborative Artist

Since arriving in Calgary in 2014, Rachel Baljeu has become active as an accompanist and has started a private teaching studio. She keeps bus with a variety of jobs including playing piano for the Ambrose University vocal program, the choirs One Accord and Arietta, as well as other vocalists and instrumentalists.

Ms. Baljeu graduated from Michigan State University with Master of Music degrees in both Piano Pedagogy and Collaborative Piano. Her teachers included opera conductor and pianist Alan Nathan for collaborative piano, and Deborah Moriarty and Derek Polischuk for solo piano. She received her Bachelor's degree from Grand Valley State University, where she had the invaluable opportunity to study piano pedagogy with Helen Marlais and piano with the esteemed collaborative pianist and Mark Markham.

Andrea Case Cello (Amici, Junior Amici, Amicini Coach)

Cellist Andrea Case has a Master's Degree in cello performance from McGill University where she studied on scholarship with Antonio Lysy. Andrea is co-founder and cellist of the Lily String Quartet, a group that has completed multiple tours across Canada, has performed for CBC Radio 2 and released a jazz CD with the award-winning Hutchinson Andrew Trio. Andrea has played with orchestras in Europe, Japan, California, Quebec and Alberta. She records regularly in multiple genres including pop/folk, jazz and classical. Andrea has 17 years of teaching and coaching experience from Mount Royal Conservatory, Amici String Program and Chinook School of Music, all in Calgary, and the Lippert School of Music in Toronto. Andrea adjudicates at festivals throughout Alberta and British Columbia. She is an Artistic Director of Calgary's Kensington Sinfonia and performs regularly with this group along with baroque ensemble String Theory Music Collective and Lily String Quartet.

Eva Hordos Collaborative Artist

Eva Hordos was born in Budapest, Hungary and began her piano studies at the age of seven.

Eva completed her degree in Music Theory, Choir Conducting and Kodaly Method at the Franz Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest in 1983, studying with Erzsebet Szonyi. In the following years Eva studied with Edit Hambalko and received her degree in Piano and Piano Education in 1985. During her years of study at the university, Eva recorded as a piano soloist for the Hungarian National Radio children's program.

In 1987/88 Eva taught piano master classes throughout Spain on a contract with Real Musical, Madrid.

Since immigrating to Canada in 1992, Eva has continued to teach piano and accompany singers and other musicians, including students of the University of Calgary and Mount Royal University. Eva actively participates as an accompanist at the Calgary Performing Arts Festival, for Royal Conservatory of Music exams, at the Canadian Music Competition, as well as in recitals and auditions.

Eva lives in Calgary with her family and golden retriever Molly, and in her free time she loves baking and listening to jazz.

Diane Lane Violin & Amicini & Junior Amici Coordinator (Amici, Junior Amici & Amicini Coach)

Born in Claresholm Alberta, Diane began her violin studies in Lethbridge before attending the Mount Royal Conservatory in Calgary. Diane graduated from McGill University with her Bachelor of Music degree under the tutelage of Yehonatan Berick. She continued her studies with Edmond Agopian at the University of Calgary and graduated with a Master's degree in violin performance.

Diane has attended The Banff Centre for the Arts as a resident and has returned many times, both as a solo performer and chamber musician. Diane is a founding member of Calgary's Lily String Quartet. The quartet participated in seminars at The Julliard School of Music and Stanford University and has performed across Canada.

Diane is a highly sought-after orchestral and chamber performer; playing with various ensembles in and around Calgary. She is currently the Assistant Concertmaster of the Red Deer Symphony Orchestra, a member of Kensington Sinfonia and a member of Rosa Barocca. Diane has adjudicated at numerous music festivals throughout Alberta and British Columbia. Diane is on faculty with the Amici String Program and maintains a violin studio at Mount Royal Conservatory.

John Lowry Violin (Amici Coach)

John Lowry has been Associate Concertmaster of the Calgary Philharmonic since 1987, and has also served as guest concertmaster in Edmonton, Winnipeg, and Adelaide, South Australia. As a former freelancer, he appeared frequently with the Toronto Symphony, National Arts Centre Orchestra, Canadian Opera Company, National Ballet, Boston Pops, Opera Company of Boston, Esprit and New Haven Symphony. John was the founder and first artistic director of the Kensington Sinfonia in Calgary, and has appeared as soloist with orchestras in Calgary, Edmonton, Toronto, Halifax and others; with conductors including Mario Bernardi, Hans Graf and James Judd.

John Lowry VIOLIN (CONT)

He began his violin studies in Edmonton with Ranald Shean, continuing on to graduate from the University of Toronto (BM), and Yale University (MM). His principal teachers included George Neikrug, David Zafer and Oscar Shumsky. Other important mentors included Steven Staryk, Rafael Hillyer, Joseph Silverstein, Szymon Goldberg, and members of the Orford and Tokyo Quartets.

John was the founder and first Artistic Director of the Kensington Sinfonia in Calgary, and was founder and violinist of Land's End Ensemble for 24 years, touring extensively and winning the WCMA for Outstanding Classical Recording in 2005 and 2006, as well as a Juno Award in 2014. He has given premieres of dozens of chamber works by composers such as R. Murray Schafer, Omar Daniel, Alexina Louie, Allan Gordon Bell, Jocelyn Morlock and Peter Maxwell Davies. He performed at the International Society for Contemporary Music World Music Days in Vancouver in 2017. He has collaborated with James Campbell, Evelyn Glennie, Robert Aitken, Barry Shiffman, Joel Sachs, Angela Cheng, Rivka Golani and many others. He has performed with Aventa Ensemble, Athabasca Quartet, Trio Haydn de Montréal, and Yale Contemporary Ensemble. He is currently Artistic Director and first violinist in *Astralis*. His violin was made by Carlo Ferdinando Landolfi in Milan in 1769.

He was previously on the faculty of U of Manitoba and U of Lowell (MA), and has also taught at U of Calgary. He currently teaches at MRU Conservatory and Amici String Program. He has been on the faculty of summer programs at the Banff Centre, Comox Valley Youth Music Centre, Langley Community Music School, SUNY Potsdam, JVL Summer School, Spencer Brook String Program in Massachusetts, and Vancouver Island Music Academy. He is an expert in the Dounis violin method and a frequent audition coach. Recipients of his coaching have won positions in professional orchestras, and his students have earned top prizes in local and national festivals and competitions.

Olena Kilchyk VIOLIN (AMICI COACH)

Olena Kilchyk, native of Odessa, Ukraine, graduated from the Odessa State Music College and the Odessa State Conservatory. Since the age 14 Olena was the winner of numerous concerto competitions. While in Ukraine, she was a principal cellist and soloist of the Acedemia Odessa Chamber Orchestra and Virtuosi of Odessa Chamber Orchestra.

After immigrating to Canada, Olena received Master of Music Degree in Cello Performance from the University of Calgary. In 2000 she was the winner of the Department of Music Concerto Competition and performed with the U of C String Quartet.

Olena has been a member of the Prince George, Okanagan, Red Deer and Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra as well as Sinfonia Alberta Chamber Orchestra, Baroque Modern Chamber Orchestra, Players Chamber Ensemble and Saint Crispinis Chamber Ensemble.

Ms. Kilchyk toured extensively throughout Russia, Ukraine, Europe, Canada and China. Many of her performances have been broadcast on CBC and other radio and television networks and she had the opportunity to play with such artists as Michael Buble and 2Cellos.

Hana Kyung-Hui Kim Collaborative Artist

Hana Kyung-Hui Kim obtained her bachelor and master's degrees (B.Mus and M.Mus) in piano performance at Université de Montreal with Natalie Pépin and Claude Labelle.

As a pianist she won numerous awards in Canada and Korea such as the Canadian Music Competition and the Young Age Music Competition. Hana was invited to play at the Festival International de Musique de Montréal at Place Bonaventure and at the Open House of La Cinquième Salle in Place des Arts.

She participated in the Orford Arts Center summer camp with Andre Laplante and studied with Maria Clodes-Jaguaribe at the Boston University Tanglewood Institute with the help of the Canadian Club of Boston Tuition Scholarship. Hana also received a scholarship from the Korean-Canadian Scholarship Foundation and Fondation Vincent-d'Indy. She studied accompaniment with Louise-Andrée Baril, one of the premier accompanists in Quebec, and has extensive experience as a vocal and choral accompanist.

Hana is also an active choral conductor and studied at Westminster Choir College Conducting Institute in Princeton, New Jersey, under the instruction of James Jordan and Andrew Magill. She further studied with Timothy Shantz and John Washburn at various workshops and masterclasses.

In 2009, Hana founded the Calgary Korean Canadian Choir (CKCC). Under her direction, the CKCC has had notable performances at the Jack Singer Concert Hall, including a benefit concert to honour Canadian veterans of the Korean War and a performance of Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 with the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, Calgary Philharmonic Chorus and Cantaré Children's Choir. The CKCC also represented Canada on an invitational tour of South Korea to celebrate the 70th Anniversary of Korean Independence. This event was broadcasted live via KBS TV throughout South Korea. The CKCC continues to perform annually all through Calgary and its surrounding area.

Hana is fluent in English, French and Korean.

Katherine Mihyun Kim Collaborative Artist

A native Korean, Katherine Mihyun Kim is a solo pianist, chamber musician and teacher. After she moved to Calgary, she pursued Bachelor's degree in piano performance at the University of Calgary under Marilyn Engle. She then went on to earn her Master's degree in piano performance at New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, studying under Gabriel Chodos. Her education was enriched by pursuing her Doctoral degree (Dissertation: Spain and Beyond: Spanish Influence in Piano Music of the Nineteenth and Early Twentieth Centuries) at the University of Minnesota under Alexander Braginsky in 2011.

She gave a lecture-recital on *Spanish Folk Influence on Manuel de Falla'sPiezasEspañolas*at the College Music Society 25th Pacific Northwest Chapter Conference at Capilano University in North Vancouver. Further, after winning the Masters Concerto and Aria Competition, she was invited to perform Shostakovich Piano Concerto No.2 with Kenwood Symphony Orchestra Minneapolis. Recently, she performed Liszt Piano concerto No.2 with a community orchestra led by Nicholas Choy in Calgary. She has also performed in a number of music festivals as a solo pianist and chamber musician, such as the World Piano

Meeting in Coimbra, Portugal, the International Keyboard Institute and Festival in New York, the Aspen Music Festival in Colorado, the Academie Franco-Americaine/Music Studies Abroad in Vaison-la-Romaine, Provence, France, and Oberlin's summer program in Casalmaggiore, Italy. In addition, she has played at several piano master classes with Anton Kuerti, with André Laplante at the Honens International Piano Competition, with Victor Rosenbaum at the International Keyboard Institute and Festival, and with Aguiles Delle Vigne and Makoto Ueno at Coimbra World Piano Meeting.

She is very pleased to move back to Calgary where her family resides and proud to serve as a piano faculty at Mount Royal University Conservatory and a collaborative pianist at Academy for Gifted Youth Program. Sora Kim Violin (Amicini Coach)

Sora has enjoyed an active career for the past 11 years as a Calgary-area teacher and performer. In addition to her private studio, she has been a regular clinician via the MRU Conservatory workshop program, strings instructor at Rundle College, and adjudicator for local festivals. Sora is an alumnus of the MRU Conservatory Academy, and is currently pursuing a BSc/BMus with Edmond Agopian at the University of Calgary, where she also serves as co-concertmaster of the University of Calgary orchestra. She holds a special interest in non-profit, accessible, and equitable strings education.

Jesse Morrison VIOLA

Violist Jesse Morrison is currently in his third season as a member of the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra. He was recently living in Toronto where he frequently played with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, as well as the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra. Jesse graduated in May 2017 with a M.M from the New England Conservatory (NEC) in Boston, studying with Kim Kashkashian. He had his solo debut in Jordan Hall when performing as the winner of the Chamber Orchestra Competition at NEC in 2016 and again in 2017 with the Symphony Orchestra. Recipient of the 2016 Sylva Gelber Award, Mr. Morrison is an avid chamber musician and is an alumnus of festivals such as Yellow Barn, Kneisel Hall, the New York String Seminar, the Banff Centre and Domaine Forget. Jesse has also participated as artist in residence at the Flatirons Chamber Music Festival in Boulder, CO, "Concerts in the Barn" in Quilcene, WA, Sunset Chamber Music Festival in Los Angeles and NEXUS Chamber Music in Chicago. He was a member of the Neruda String Quartet in 2015-16 in Boston and from 2011-2015, he was the violist in the Arkadas String Quartet based in Toronto, A native of Toronto, Ontario, Jesse received a B.M. from the University of Toronto under Teng Li and an A.D from the Glenn Gould School under Steven Dann. Mr. Morrison is an artistic director for Music for Food - Canada, which is a musician-led initiative that raises resources and awareness in the fight against hunger.

Andrea Poon Viola & Ear Training/Musicianship (Junior Amici Coach)

Andrea Poon completed her BMus in performance with honours from the University of Toronto, her MMus in performance, as well as her Pre-Doctorate Diploma (D.E.P.A) from l'Université de Montréal. Andrea has been very fortunate to have studied with Fiona Carnie, Katharine Rapoport, and Jutta Puchhammer-Sédillot.

As an avid ensemble musician, Andrea has had the opportunity to play with many diverse chamber ensembles and orchestras across the country and Europe. In 2019 Andrea, along with Timepoint Ensemble, premiered Ghost Opera as after completing a residency at the prestigious Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity.

Ronelle Schaufele VIOLA & VIOLIN

Canadian violist Ronelle Schaufele is an active solo, chamber and orchestral musician who performs frequently throughout Western Canada as well as performances in Cuba, Brazil, United States, New Zealand and Europe. As an avid lover of new music, Ms Schaufele has been delighted to play works composed for her and looks forward to upcoming collaborations. In addition to performing music being created today, Ronelle greatly enjoys erforming on period instruments and exploring the rich baroque tradition.

In addition, she has served as principal violist for the Urban Village Chamber Orchestra, and is currently assistant principal violist in the Red Deer Symphony Orchestra.

Her education includes a Music Performance Diploma from Mount Royal College with William van der Sloot, a Bachelor of Music with distinction from the University of Calgary, with Nicholas Pulos.

Christine Sul Accompanist

She began playing the piano at the age of 6 and started formal lessons at the age of 10 under Prof. Taehui Park until completing her first year of the Busan Arts High School. She then moved to Canada and completed her Bachelor of Music degree at the University of Calgary, studying with Prof. Marilyn Engle.

Christine has earned numerous distinguished accolades in Korea, including top prizes at the Busan Joongang and the Changwon International Meister Piano Competitions. She made her orchestral debut in 2008 when she performed Mozart Piano Concerto No. 21 in C Major, K. 467 with the Soloists of Volgograd Orchestra. In 2021, Christine became the Prairies Favourite for the 19-25 years old division of the Canadian Music Competition. In 2023, Christine performed with the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra as an RBC Concerto Competition winner.

She is currently a faculty member of the Mount Royal University Conservatory. As a teacher, Christine aims to teach her students by utilizing the strengths and advantages of the various teaching and playing styles she has experienced in Korea, Canada and Europe. She helps her students express a wide range of emotions and stories through playing piano. She also emphasizes the importance of proper technique that aligns with the music and strives to inspire her students to appreciate the beauty and joy of life through the gift of music.
